Professor Jon** Davis and Dr Chetun Patel. who teach alongside renowned practitioners such as former shadow Chancellor Ed Balls: The Independent's Chief Political Commentator **John Rentoul:** and the Head of the Prime Minister's Delivery Unit under Tony Blair Sir Michael Barber. Teaching practitioners are joined by stellar guests. Every year since 2017 we've

brought a former Prime Minister to engage with our students, offering unparalleled access to the minds behind pivotal decisions. Sir Tony **Blair, Lord Cameron, Lady Theresa** May, and Gordon Brown have all shared their insights with students on our modules. We've also welcomed a host of notable speakers, including George Osborne, Alastair Campbell, **Anji Hunter, Baroness Jay** and many more distinguished personalities.

These two modules, run in partnership with No.10 Downing Street, examine how British Prime Ministers governed in the years 1945 – to the present day.

These are the flagship modules of the Strand Group and were in our previous incarnation as the Mile End Group. The module started in 1992 as "Cabinet, Premiership and the Conduct of British Central Government since 1945". It was created by Professor Peter (now the Lord) Hennessy to analyse the mechanics of government and utilise his extensive contacts to being the foremost practitioners into the classroom. This module was the basis of the style and methodology that the MA in Government Studies still uses today.

The modules now are led by **Professor** Jon Davis, alongside co-teachers Dr Michelle Clement. Dr Jack Brown and Martin Stolliday. Special attention is given to the memoirs and diaries of the prime ministers, cabinet ministers and senior officials involved in managing the central machinery of government, as well as firsthand testimony from a selection of highly-relevant and high profile

guests. Classes take place within No. 10 Downing Street itself, and guest speakers have included former Prime Ministers Sir Tony Blair, Lord **Cameron** and **Lady Theresa May**, academic **Lord Hennessy** and Cabinet Secretaries Lord Armstrong, Lord **Butler, Lord Turnbull, Lord Wilson,** Lord O'Donnell. Lord Heywood. Lord Sedwill and Simon Case.



"Chancellors and the Treasury: Managing the British Economy" is the result of a unique collaboration between His Majesty's Treasury the Policy Institute at King's and the Strand Group. It studies the role and actions of the Treasury and its Chancellors since the Second World War up to the present day, through the context of the British economy.

The module is led by **Dr Chetun Patel** and co-taught weekly by former Shadow Chancellor and Chief Economic Adviser to the Treasury **Ed Balls** and former Permanent Secretary to the Treasury Lord Macpherson of Earl's Court.

the Treasury Sir Danny Alexander, David Gauke and Yvette Cooper and, permanent secretaries past and present including Lord Burns, Sir Tom Scholar and James Bowler.

A wider teaching panel includes senior Treasury official, Mario Pisani, Deputy Governor at the Bank of England, Clare Lombardelli and Catherine MacLeod. former special adviser to Chancellor Alistair Darling.

Prominent special guest speakers will further increase the stellar teaching panel - in previous years these have included former Chancellors George Osborne, Lord Lawson, Gordon Brown, Lord Darling, Lord Clarke, Lord **Hammond. Saiid Javid. Lord Lamont** and former Chief Secretaries of



The module considers the New Labour governments from a historical perspective, tracing changes and themes across the thirteen years of Tony Blair's and Gordon Brown's premierships, using the rigour of the historical method. Special attention is given to the memoirs and diaries of the central protagonists, and a high-profile range of guests allow students to truly interrogate their sources face-to-face.

New Labour was a transformative government with a legacy that remains instructive for politicians and policymakers on both sides of the political spectrum. This module sees students learn and debate the breadth of New Labour years - the personal history of the key protagonists, the role of media spin, the power of the Treasury under Brown, the development of transformative public service reform, the role of special advisers, foreign policy and the Iraq War.

The course is co-taught by **Dr Michelle Clement: Professor Jon** Davis and John Rentoul. Chief Political Commentator for The Independent, biographer of Blair and King's Visiting Professor The course was founded. in 2008 and has been a pioneering learning environment for the study of the New Labour years. The first book

of the course. Heroes or Villains?: The Blair Government Reconsidered. was written by Rentoul and Davis.

The seminars see a wide range of prominent participants from government and the Civil Service invited to speak and to field questions. In the past guests have included Ed Balls, Lord Blunkett, Alastair Campbell, Anji Hunter, Baroness Jay, Lord Mandelson, Alan Milburn, Baroness Morgan, Lord O'Donnell, Sir Kevin Tebbit. and Sir Tony Blair himself.



This module explores the recent history and government of London.

Taught by **Dr Jack Brown**, "London: Governing the Global City", uses the city's history to examine how to best run a globally competitive "world city" such as London, and takes full advantage of King's' position at the heart of the capital, offering students a unique educational experience, firmly rooted in place.

The module deals with Londonwide and local government, but also explores the significant role of the private sector in the city's governance. Finally, it engages directly with the huge past and current challenges that face not only London but other world cities and devolved city and city-region governments across the country.

The module makes great use of practitioner-led teaching, with students getting a chance to engage directly with key London leaders. Previous special guests included current Mayor of London Sadiq Khan; former mayor Boris Johnson's Chief Strategic Adviser and Mayoral Chief

of Staff Lord Edward Lister; former Metropolitan Police Commissioner Dame Cressida Dick: former Transport for London Commissioner Sir Peter Hendy, and many more.

Alongside seminars at King's, classes have also taken place at City Hall, the City of London's ancient Guildhall, One Canada Square in Canary Wharf and 22 Bishopsgate. There can surely be no better way for students to understand how this world-leading city works than by engaging directly with those who have been responsible for running it and experiencing it for themselves.



The Conservative Years builds on the successful approach of "New Labour in Government", and brings its focus into even more ultra-contemporary historical study.

Taught by Dr Jack Brown, the module explores the politics and personalities that influenced the direction and actions of successive Conservative administrations since 2010. Looking at the inner workings of the Coalition government, the changing relationship between the prime minister and their party across the period, and the rise and fall of at least five Conservative leaders. Paying particular attention to the government-dominating issues of Austerity. Brexit and the government's response to the Covid-19 pandemic. It also explores the inner working of the Conservative Party itself, and how it evolved over the period.

The ultra-contemporary focus of this module gives students the opportunity to have their thinking evolve continually, as new primary and secondary source material emerges and guest speakers

offer original contributions to our understanding of these tumultuous years. It makes great use of speeches, government documents where publicly available, and memoirs, alongside quality reporting, to build a framework for understanding the inner workings of central government since 2010.

Guest speakers from within government are invited to join seminars, allowing students to interrogate their sources directly and in person.



This innovative module, delivered in partnership with the Cabinet Office, focuses on the evolution of the British Civil Service and how its role has developed alongside the changing role of the state. World wars, the creation of the welfare state, as well as technological, economic and societal change has carved new functions and expectations of what government is there to do.

Much of the focus of the study of British government centres on the politicians the powerful individuals who lead government for a period. Though they are powerful and vital, Prime Ministers and their Cabinet are temporary. There is however a permanent side of the coin in British government – the Civil Service. The Civil Service acts as a repository of influence and institutional power in government. At present there are close to 500,000 civil servants based in Whitehall and around the country. The Civil Service has historically been a place where many people spend much of their careers, and work for governments of several different political hues. Yet there is a lack of understanding of how this enduring institution has shaped the history and workings of statecraft. This module will be led by **Dr Michelle Clement** and Professor Jon Davis

The module includes innovative teaching techniques that centre on individual, small group and whole class learning to debate and develop our critical understanding of how and why the Civil Service works. We also utilise our proximity to the heart of British government to conduct special guest classes with practitioners. Students gain a strategic understanding of how the British Civil Service has developed. how the most senior civil servant position of Cabinet Secretary was established and how it has evolved. how successive prime ministers have shaped this permanent part of the state, and how public services have been shaped by governments since 1945. This strategic foundation sets students in excellent stead for careers and further study in and around British government.



This unique module focuses on the pivotal moments for Prime Ministers, using case studies to examine the decision making process.

Led by **Dr Chetun Patel** and Professor Jon Davis, this module builds on the successful implementation of case study learning across our suite of modules. Students explore the pivotal moments of decision making faced by Prime Ministers since 1945.

It will explore issues such as:

- The decision to build an independent nuclear deterrent
- Suez Crisis
- The withdrawal of the UK from "Fast of Suez"
- The decision to build Concorde
- The EEC referendum
- Callaghan and the vote of no confidence
- The Falklands War
- The Miners Strike
- · Good Friday Agreement
- Huawei and 5G security

Students make full use of specially created case studies, putting forward the arguments for courses of action having weighed the issues of the day. They will also prepare briefing papers. Based on the approach of Harvard Professors Richard E. Neustadt and Ernest R. May the module seeks to help decisionmakers become more attentive to the proper "uses of history."

Guest speakers and experts will be invited to join the sessions.




The MA in Government Studies has a strong social mobility focus, with places provided on the programme from businesses such as Amazon Web Services and others.

The Programme is specially designed with student career paths in mind. We focus on improving student knowledge, attributes and skills so alumni can flourish in a variety of roles.

- There is practitioner involvement in all teaching. Practitioners are anchored by an academic chair in the room to facilitate the discussions. This provides students with an applied framework to understand how the decisionmaking process in government works beyond a theoretical understanding, bringing together the three distinct strands of policy, processes and personality.
- Employability is be hard-wired into every aspect of this programme. Students use historical analysis to shape their thinking.
- The dissertation aspect of the programme is flexible in its design, allowing students to focus on a purely historical analysis whilst in-career public servants and others will be able to undertake bespoke research project focusing on a particular challenge.
- Students also gain knowledge of public-service ethos and the skills needed to pursue public sector career paths.

- Case study teaching with a focus on skills gives students more practical skills that will be applicable in all workplaces. These include the ability to confidently take decisions, write clear and concise briefings, give presentations and learn soft skills essential for networking opportunities.
- Small group tutorials further enable formative assessment and help students develop the skills they need for future work.
- Through our contacts and support from industry and government we have created an employability ecosystem around the programme.
- The programme features industry driven content reflecting governmental and political sectors.
- We bring in former students who have taken our modules and provide a system through which our alumni can provide formal and informal mentoring opportunities.
